The Global Mobility of Talent Research Group, led by Dr. Martin Geiger, recently received a Partnership Development Grant from the Social Sciences and Humanities Research Council of Canada (SSHRC). With particular focus on Canada and China, the project investigates how companies compete in the race for global talent. It seeks to identify solutions and develop advice to design and enhance policies and programs on the recruitment and retention of highly skilled migrants for innovation and growth.

In the global race for talent, little is known about the current practices and policies of global talent recruitment and retention, and their outcomes and effectiveness. This partnership will engage with both academic and non-academic partners providing access to industry, government and other relevant stakeholders. Our partnered research project will fill critical gaps in current knowledge and inform an enhanced global management of international high-skilled mobility.
